Keeping Blindness Away: Heading Off Glaucoma Before It's Too Late

Rick Bartlett, OD, was part of an eye team of 8 optometrists who donated their time this past February to serve in HFHC's Child Care Clinics. They brought with them over \$200,000 worth of donated glaucoma medicines to distribute to those identified with this insidious disease. This is what he had to say about his experience.

Glaucoma disease without symptoms – usually there is no pain. It will just gradually take your sight before you realize it. One day you wake up and you have lost all your vision. Glaucoma is an epidemic here [in Haiti]. Statistics show that in developed countries, the incidence of glaucoma rate is about 2%. In Haiti, studies are showing that 1 out of every 5 Haitians will develop glaucoma sometime in their lifetime. But even more concerning, we saw it appearing in the younger population more than any other demographic that I am aware of. I have been in practice


38 years, and I have never diagnosed glaucoma in a child. This week, in our clinic, out of the 800 children we examined, we put 8 sponsored kids between the ages of 8 and 12 on glaucoma drops. And we also identified a lot of "glaucoma suspects" who will need to be watched and monitored as well.

This is a very tangible result of HFHC's work. We are catching glaucoma in these kids and giving them a year's worth of drops to keep their pressures down. The drops will be dispensed either at school or at home. We will continue to follow these children, and make sure that their eye pressures are under control and their vision is being preserved.

There is huge value in the sponsored child eye clinics in identifying these children early. They are the hope and future of Haiti.



Phito Oupette: A True Success Story



Meet Phito. In 1999, Phito was brought to Cazeau Christian Orphanage at age 10 after his mother passed away. Through HFHC's child sponsorship program, Phito was able to receive a quality Christian education at Cazeau Christian School. After finishing high school, he became a plumber in order to earn a living and provide for his family. While working in this field, Phito decided to study theology at Delmas University of Theology and now teaches Bible classes at the Cazeau Church of Christ. He also made a career transition and currently spends his days working as a tutor and administrator at the Cazeau Christian School.

"I am serving the Cazeau School because they gave to me," explains Phito. "Now I am giving back."

Along with his daily task of raising the Haitian flag, Phito has responsibilities to oversee and facilitate student interactions. He explains that some days are easier than others. "It is a lot to watch over the kids." He hopes the children are learning to take life seriously and that they see him as a good example.

Although he cares for the children of Cazeau Christian School, Phito also has the joy of a family at home. He and his wife raise a son and a daughter. Tragically, his daughter has been paralyzed from birth. When asked about how this affects his life, Phito suggests that

his life is not merely about himself.

When we met for dinner the first night, Beverly, HFHC's Joy Box Coordinator, gave us the numbers. We were going to give out over 1,700 Joy Boxes in five days.

Each day was full of delivering gifts, but nothing compared to watching the children open their Joy Boxes. They would go through them very carefully and excitedly, inspecting everything inside and showing all of their friends what they got. Every child sat on the edge of their seat hoping to get a box just like the other children. Unfortunately, not every child who came to the school or church with the hope of getting a box received one. It was heartbreaking to see a child walk away empty-handed. This is one of the many reasons why the sponsorship program is so important. The sponsored children were guaranteed a Joy Box with their name on it. While receiving a Joy Box is not the most important aspect



The Christmas Joy Box effort will begin again in July, and we would love for you to participate! If you are interested, contact joybox@hopeforhaitischildren.org.


Lighting the Way in Haiti

Thanks to generous donors, the Robert Christian School, located in a remote village in western Haiti, and the Thomazeau Christian School in central Haiti recently received much-needed solar electric systems! Schoolchildren now enjoy brighter learning environments, teachers and administrators have consistent electricity for basic equipment, and church members can hold evening gatherings at the school/church buildings. Outdoor security lighting has also enabled local students to meet in the evenings to study and fellowship together. At HFHC's Hope Center in Thomazeau, newly constructed Camp Hope cabins are equipped with solar power, and 13 powerful outdoor LED solar lights improve security for the entire campus.





An added blessing from this work includes the involvement of two graduates from HFHC's sponsorship program. James Charlemagne and Agguy Oxi apprenticed with the owner of the Haitian company LC Renewable Energy Solutions and learned how to set up and install solar systems. The company informed us that after engaging in on-site training, James and Agguy installed the solar electric systems at two of our Camp Hope cabins. We are certainly proud of these two graduates and their vocational success!

Frequently Asked Questions

- **2:** What are the dates of the school year?
- $A\colon$ Mid-September through June
 - What percentage of children attend school?

Only around 50% of school-age children attend elementary school and approximately 20% attend secondary school. At HFHC, 93% of sponsored students in elementary school pass the 6th grade and promote into secondary school.

$oldsymbol{2}$: What is the structure for the grades in Haiti?

- ⇒ *Preschool:* Although not compulsory, preschool is offered to children ages 3-5.
- ⇒ Primary School (Elementary): Grades 1 6
- ⇒ Lower Secondary School (Middle School): Grades 7 9; A National exam is given in the 9th grade. If a student does not pass this exam at the end of the year, they must repeat the grade again.
- ⇒ Upper Secondary School (High School): Grades 10 13;
 Although a student may complete the 13th and final grade, they must also pass a standardized National Exam to receive a diploma. Students spend the entire year preparing for this difficult exam. If they do not pass, they can retake the exam or repeat the grade and try again.

$oldsymbol{\mathcal{Q}}$: What will students do during the summer?

Just like children around the world, students are excited for the summer break! Most will stay home and some might visit family members in other villages. For teens ages 13-16, they will count the days until they get to attend HFHC's summer camps held in June, July, and August.

Q: What do students say about their education?

Almost every student asks for prayers that they will be successful in school. Education is highly valued by all, and young people know that it is essential in helping them escape the cycle of poverty. They remain grateful for the opportunity to attend school!
